Faculty Information

Faculty tenured/tenure eligible positions in A&S, as a whole, increased from 366 in 2004-05 to 381 in 2009-10, representing an increase of 4%.

Overall, tenured faculty represented 39% of the resignations over the 6 year period compared to 61% for tenure-eligible faculty. By area, tenured faculty resignations accounted for 59% in the Sciences, 27% in the Social Sciences and 28% in the Humanities.
