

EPC – Minutes

March 02, 2001

Attending: Eric Bradley, Cory Butler, Jim Deffenbaugh, Gary DeFotis, Joan Gavalier, Satoshi Ito, Tom Payne, Constance Pilkington, and Darlene Crouch, permanent secretary for the committee.

Dean Barbara Watkinson, Chair of EPC, called the meeting to order at 12:00 noon in Tucker 114.

Minutes from February 23, 2001 were approved.

Dean Watkinson announced that Hispanic Studies will use the prefix (HS) for all courses.

Jim Deffenbaugh suggested that on the EPC New Course forms it would be better if it had his name as the contact person for the library holdings.

I. New Business:

- A. Geology Concentration changes were discussed. A motion was made by Joan Gavalier to accept the changes with the suggestion that Geology add Chemistry 103, 206 or 306 to the last line in the catalog which states that "Mathematics 111, 112 and Physics 101, 102 are strongly recommended for the student who wishes to pursue geology at the professional level".

Satoshi Ito made a motion that EPC approve the new course GEO 311, Field Methods in the Earth Sciences. Seconded: Joan Gavalier

Vote: Unanimous

The following courses were discussed:

- A. AMST 201, American Popular Culture and Modern America (new course and GER 4A). After discussion the EPC members approved the course for 3 credits, but not 4-credits as requested. It was agreed that American Studies can submit it again next year for 4-credits, if they can show the correct amount of contact hours between professor and students to justify 4-credits.
- B. ANTH 346 to ANTH 426), Foodways and the Archaeological Record (number change) – Approved
- C. ECON 300, Topics in Economics (cross-listed in Fall 2001 with ANTH 350) – Approved

- D. INTL 390, Topics (cross-listed with AMST 350, Seeking Our Shadows: Casting Light on the Screens) – Approved for not more than 3-credits.

- V. KIN 208, Prevention and care of injury and illness (change in title and catalog description)
- W. WMST, 380, Rhymes with Witch: Sexual Politics in Contemporary (change in course title)

A motion was made by Connie Pilkington that American Studies curriculum be approved with the understanding that AMST 201, American Popular Culture and Modern America only count as a 3-credit course. Seconded: Joan Gavalier Vote: Unanimous
