Symposium Committee Leadership Positions:

Event Manager: Assists the Humanities and Sciences Chairs in the coordination, organization, and implementation of the Graduate Research Symposium, including room setup, presentation (a/v), catering, and guest services.

Volunteer Coordinator: Will plan, organize, and manage the event volunteers. Duties include assigning volunteer tasks, creating volunteer schedules, and overseeing registration procedures during the event.

Speaker Coordinator: Identify and contact potential speaker(s). Duties include arranging and providing for guest speaker(s) travel, lodging, honorarium, and all other needs.

Internal Communication Specialist: Will be responsible for marketing the event to the College of William and Mary faculty, staff, and students. RESEARCH & TRAVEL FUNDING

A&S GRADUATE STUDENT RESEARCH GRANTS. A&S Graduate students are encouraged to apply for support [maximum of \$300] from the Office of Graduate Studies and Research that will allow them to collect data at museums or archives, conduct research, and travel to field work sites. The purpose of the support is to enhance the graduate students' professional preparation. Not all applicants will receive funding or full funding; therefore, students are encouraged to apply for additional aid or matching funds from other sources and to indicate this information on their applications. Such information will be viewed favorably in the evaluation process. Funding will be limited to direct research related activities. **Eligibility:** Any graduate student actively enrolled in a graduate program of Arts & Sciences, and who is in good academic standing may apply. Students who have previously received a Graduate Student Research Grant from the Office of Graduate Studies and Research are eligible to apply, but applications from students who have not previously received such a grant will be given higher funding priority. International travel is not supported. **Application Procedure:** There will be three opportunities to apply in 2009-2010 (one in October, one in February and one in April). Applications for Fall 2009 must be received in the Office of Graduate Studies and Research by 4:00 p.m. on **October 9, 2009**, and will cover expenses incurred September 1 through December 31, 2009. Late applications will not be accepted. Applications must be signed by the student's faculty advisor, and must also include a signed Institutional Compliance Form. DON'T BE FOOLED BY E-MAIL FRAUD!

Information Technology or other offices at W&M will NEVER ask you to send your password, social security number, account numbers, or other personal information to them in an e-mail message. Also, you should never just click a web link in an e-mail message and type your private information; be sure you know that the web address is legitimate first. Every year at W&M, "phishing" e-mail messages fool students, faculty, and staff into providing private data, such as a password or account number, to criminals. These fraudulent e-mail messages can even look like they've been sent from an official wm.edu address or look like they connect to an official W&M web site. CAMPUS-WIDE EMERGENCY ALERT SYSTEM

During emergency situations or closings due to inclement weather, the College uses several methods to alert the campus. An emergency notification system, Blackboard Connect, is used to notify students, faculty and staff via voice, email and

text messages sent over land lines and cell phones. In addition, an audible alert or siren will sound if an event poses imminent danger, and the College's homepage provides alerts and continuing information as the emergency develops. This emergency notification system is tested at the beginning of each semester to ensure proper functioning.

For this system to work, it is essential that the College have a way to contact you. Students are required to register at least one phone number, which should be your own, in the emergency notification system. Additionally, students can register a total of six phone numbers of people to be notified in the event of a campus-wide emergency. We encourage you to discuss with your family who you should register into the system. The data you provide will only be used in the event of an emergency. It will not be made available for any other purpose. So, when you receive the request to input your contact information, please do so promptly. You will not be able to validate your registration for the fall until you have done so.

NOTE: *This is not to be confused with the Emergency Contact, which are the name(s) and phone number(s) of those who would be contacted should you have a personal emergency.*

Important information on W&M health care and insurance eligibility for 2009-10

Students who want to be eligible for the College's Student Insurance Plan and for use of the Student Health Center in 2009-10 should be sure to understand the following information.

(1) Students who were admitted to the College for Fall 2006 or later and who register full-time or with Research Graduate status will be enrolled in and billed for the College's Student Insurance Plan unless proof of other adequate health insurance coverage was provided by submitting a waiver request that was subsequently approved prior to the July 1, 2009 deadline (extended to September 4, 2009). Students who didn't request a waiver because they want to enroll in the Student Insurance Plan should already see a charge for "Student Health Insurance" on their Student Account; contact Trista Sikes (trsike@wm.edu) immediately if this charge has not appeared. The waiver request is available on the Insurance page of the Student Health Center website at <http://www.wm.edu/offices/healthcenter/studentinsurance/waiverinfo/index.php>. This requirement includes students who receive a W&M Master's degree and are then admitted to a W&M PhD program. All F-1 & J-1 International students are automatically enrolled in the Student Insurance Plan.

(2) Students in the above categories who did not complete the waiver by July 1, 2009 (extended to September 4, 2009), will have the Student Insurance coverage billed to their student account in two installments ("Annual in Installments"). Students should read the points below carefully to determine whether their circumstances require "Annual" coverage rather than "Annual in Installments" coverage. Students needing "Annual" coverage should actively enroll by completing the College Enrollment Request form at <http://www.wm.edu/offices/healthcenter/studentinsurance/enrollmentinfo/index.php> and selecting "Annual" rather than "Annual in Installments".

(3) Students who register full-time or with Research Graduate status in the Fall 2009 semester and who check the box for "Annual" coverage (NOT "Annual in Installments") on the College Enrollment Request form at <http://www.wm.edu/offices/healthcenter/studentinsurance/enrollmentinfo/index.php> will continue to be eligible for the College's Student Insurance even if they become part-time or continuous enrollment students in the Spring 2010 semester. Note that insured part-time or continuous enrollment students are eligible for pharmacy services but not medical services at the W&M Student Health Center, whereas insured full-time or Research Graduate students are eligible for both pharmacy services and medical services at the W&M Student Health Center with payment of the Student Health Center fee.

(4) Students who register full-time or with Research Graduate status in the Fall 2009 semester and who have the Student Insurance coverage billed in two installments ("Annual in Installments") or who check the box for Fall only coverage on the College Enrollment Request form will NOT be eligible for the College's Student Insurance in the Spring 2010 semester if they become part-time or continuous enrollment students. Such students should plan ahead and enroll for "Annual" coverage (NOT "Annual in Installments") using the College Enrollment Request form at <http://www.wm.edu/offices/healthcenter/studentinsurance/enrollmentinfo/index.php> if they wish to remain eligible for the College's Student Insurance in the Spring 2010 semester while they are part-time or continuous enrollment students. Note that insured part-time or continuous enrollment students are eligible for pharmacy services but not medical services at the W&M Student Health Center, whereas insured full-time or Research Graduate students are eligible for both pharmacy services and medical services at the W&M Student Health Center with payment of the Student Health Center fee.

(5) There is an option for up to six months of "Continuation coverage" at \$259/month for students who have been insured on the College's Student Insurance Plan for at least 90 days but who no longer meet the eligibility requirements, for example: (a) students who are full-time or Research Graduate students in the Fall 2009 semester, check the box for Fall only coverage or "Annual in Installments" coverage (or have their student account billed in two installments), and then become part-time or continuous enrollment students in the Spring 2010 semester, or (b) students who are full-time or Research Graduate students in the Fall 2009 semester, are enrolled in the Fall only coverage, and graduate in January 2010. The application and premium payment for Continuation coverage must be completed directly with the insurance company using a mail-in enrollment form (no online enrollment available) and cannot be billed to the student account, unlike the premium for the regular student policy.

(6) Full-time or Research Graduate students who have enrolled in the "Annual" coverage, the "Annual in Installments" coverage, or the Spring/Summer coverage remain eligible for the College's Student Insurance Plan during the summer even if they graduate in May and/or are not registered during the summer. Full-time or Research Graduate status in the spring semester qualifies students for use of the Student Health Center in the summer, with payment of the summer Student Health Center fees, unless the student graduates in May. Insured students who graduate in May are eligible for pharmacy services but not medical services at the W&M Student Health Center during the summer.

Columbia University Society of Fellows in the Humanities - Postdoctoral Fellowships. The Columbia Society of Fellows in the Humanities, with grants from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation and the William R. Kenan Trust, will appoint a number of post-doctoral fellows in the humanities for the academic year 2010-2011. **ELIGIBILITY:** Applications are invited from qualified candidates who have received the Ph.D. between 1 January 2006 and 1 July 2010. Fellows are appointed as Lecturers in appropriate departments at Columbia University and as postdoctoral research fellows. The fellowship is renewable for a second and third year. In the first year, Fellows teach one course per semester: at least one of these courses will be in the undergraduate general education program of the University. In years two and three, Fellows teach one course per year. In addition to teaching and research, the duties of Fellows include attendance at the Society's lectures and events as well as active participation in the intellectual life of the Society and of the department with which the Fellow is affiliated. HARRY S. TRUMAN LIBRARY INSTITUTE RESEARCH GRANTS PROGRAM. The Harry S. Truman Library Institute for National and International Affairs is the private, non-profit partner of the Harry S. Truman Library. The Institute's purpose is to foster the Truman Library as a center for research and as a provider of educational and public programs. Applications for funding will be considered by the Institute's Committee on Research, Scholarship and Academic Relations. Grants of up to \$2,500 are awarded biannually and are intended to enable graduate students, post-doctoral scholars and other researchers to come to the Harry S. Truman Library for one to three weeks to use its collections. Awards are to offset expenses incurred for this purpose only. Graduate students and post-doctoral scholars are particularly encouraged to apply, but applications from others engaged in advanced research will also be considered. Preference will be given to projects that have application to enduring public policy and foreign policy issues and that have a high probability of being published or publicly disseminated in some other way. The potential contribution of a project to an applicant's development as a scholar will also be considered. American Geological Institute's (AGI) Government Affairs Program Spring Semester Internships in Geoscience Public Policy. Representing the geoscience community in Washington DC, the program actively works with Congress and federal agencies to foster sound public policy in areas that affect geoscientists, including water, energy, and mineral resources; geologic hazards; environmental protection; and federal funding for geoscience research and education. AGI seeks outstanding geoscience students (undergraduates and Masters levels) with a strong interest in federal science policy for a semester-long internship in geoscience and public policy. Interns will gain a first-hand understanding of the legislative process and the operation of executive branch agencies. They will also hone both their writing and Web publishing skills. Specific activities for the interns include:

- Monitoring and analyzing geoscience-related legislation in Congress.
- Updating legislative and policy information on AGI's Web site.
- Attending House and Senate hearings and preparing summaries.
- Responding to information requests from AGI's member societies.
- Attending meetings with policy-level staff members in Congress, federal agencies, and non-governmental organizations such as the National Academy of Sciences.

AGI is planning to accept an intern during the spring semester (January through June timeframe) at a fixed stipend of \$5,000. Stipends for the interns are funded jointly by AGI and a generous grant from the American Association of Petroleum Geologists (AAPG) Foundation. The internship lasts fourteen weeks, and the starting date will be based on the schedule of the successful candidate. Nicholas Metropolis Award for Outstanding Doctoral Thesis Work in Computational Physics. The purpose of the award is to recognize doctoral thesis research of outstanding quality and achievement in computational physics and to encourage effective written and oral presentation of research results. The award consists of \$1,500 and a certificate to be presented at an awards ceremony at the Division of Computational Physics annual meeting and an additional allowance of up to \$500 to travel to the meeting. The recipient will be invited to present his or her work in an appropriate session of the meeting. Nominations will be accepted for any doctoral student (present or past) in any country for work performed as part of the requirements for a doctoral degree. Nominees must pass their thesis defense not more than 18 months before the nomination deadline. International Science and Engineering Visualization Challenge Some of science's most powerful statements are not made in words. From the diagrams of DaVinci to Rosalind Franklin's x-rays, visualization of research has a long and literally illustrious history. To illustrate is to enlighten. The National Science Foundation (NSF) and *Science* created the International Science & Engineering Visualization Challenge to celebrate that grand tradition-and to encourage its continued growth. The spirit of the competition is for communicating science, engineering and technology for education and journalistic purposes. Judges appointed by the National Science Foundation and the journal *Science* will select winners in each of five categories: photographs, illustrations, informational graphics, interactive media and non-interactive media. The winners will be published in a special section of the journal *Science* and *Science Online* and on the NSF Web site. One of the winning entries will be on the front cover of *Science*. In addition, each winner will receive a free, one-year print and on-line subscription to the journal *Science* and a certificate of appreciation. Gerald R. Ford Foundation Research Travel Grants Program. The Foundation awards grants of up to \$2,000 each in support of research in the holdings of the Gerald R. Ford Library. A grant defrays travel, living, and photocopy expenses of a research trip to the Library.
