Course Objectives:

KINE 323 - Health Policy

This course will prepare students with the knowledge, skills, and abilities necessary to think critically about current health policy. This is an undergraduate course that introduces the fundamental characteristics and organizational structures of the US health system as well as the differences in systems in other countries and global governance of health. Students will study the basic concepts of legal, ethical, economic and regulatory dimensions of health care and public health and the roles, influences and responsibilities of the different agencies and branches of government. Basic concepts of public health communication, including technical and professional writing and presentation will be studied.

The course will provide a framework for developing and analyzing a range of health policy issues. The course begins by introducing an approach for rationally analyzing any public health policy issue. Other models of the policy process are also presented.

Four analytic skills commonly used by policy makers are then introduced. The four skills are:

- 1. Analyzing historical, political, ethical, and legal ramifications
- 2. Assessing need and demand
- 3. Examining economic and financial considerations
- 4. Assessing existing programs and policies

The course will then apply these skills to examine health policy issues in greater depth.

- 1. Delivering medical care
- 2. Injury prevention and trauma care
- 3. Emergency preparedness
