Cape Town Summer 2011

The Cape Town program mixes classroom instruction and hands-on service learning, allowing students to study and experience how post-apartheid South Africa is working to combat racial, ethnic, economic, and political disparity. Students enroll in one 3-credit W&M faculty-taught course (2011 course will address South African Economic Inequality), and a 3-credit Global Studies service-learning course (GBST 489: Service Learning). For the service learning course, students work as English, math, and computer tutors to 11- and 12-year-olds in Khayelitsha, one of Cape Town's largest townships, and attend class with local faculty from diverse fields. The Cape Town program includes excursions to locations such as Robben Island (the site where Nelson Mandela was imprisoned), Table Mountain, Cape Point, and museums and historic sites in and around Cape Town.

Cape Town, which sits on the Table Bay at the southern end of Africa, is considered one of the world's most beautiful cities in the world and is home to more than 3 million people. It is a cosmopolitan city and a tourist destination. In Cape Town, students live at the University of Cape Town.
