REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ACADEMIC STATUS

January 1983 - January 1986

The Committee on Academic Status met weekly during the Spring 1983 semester, the 1983-84 and 1984-85 academic years, and the Fall 1985 semester. The CAS and the Director of Academic Support acted on 1,358 cases in the January 1985 to January 1986 period, an increase of 7.2% over the 1,267 cases acted on in the January 1984 to January 1985 period. Additionally, the 1,267 cases acted on in the January 1984 to January 1985 period reflect an increase in 22.8% over the 1,032 cases acted on in the January 1983 to January 1984 period. The attached tables show the numbers, nature, and disposition of the cases for the Spring 1983 semester, the 1983-84 and 1984-85 acacemic years, and the Fall 1985 semester.

In most of the categories listed, the number of cases fluctuates insignificantly from one year to the next with the following exceptions: the total number of students required to withdraw for academic reasons increased from 30 during the Jan. 1983 - Jan. 1984 period to 97 during the Jan. 1984 - Jan. 1985 period and subsequently decreased to 59 during the Jan. 1985 - Jan. 1986 period. In addition, 95 students were placed on or allowed to continue on probation in the Jan. 1983 - Jan. 1984 period, compared to totals of 50 and 43 students, respectively, during the subsequent two years. A further category which has shown a consistent increase is course adjustments after registration approved for non-medical reasons. This number increased from 310 in the Jan. 1983 - Jan. 1984 period to 467 during the Jan. 1984 - Jan. 1985 period and to 540 during the Jan. 1985 - Jan. 1986 period.

The CAS has attempted to be more consistent in enforcing the adding and dropping of courses after the add-drop period and would appreciate faculty cooperation in this area. In considering reinstatement applications, the CAS has had, in the past five years, to depend more on employer recommendations of applicants since almost no colleges and universities will enroll students not in good standing at William and Mary, and returning students are unable to prove themselves academically.
