5. Discussion of CLA proposals for stand-alone COLL 300s and 400s and for additional COLL 300 attributes

COLL 300/400

The chair gave the background of the CLA proposal for stand-alone COLL 300's and 400's. These courses would function like the COLL 100/150's where COLL would be the prefix as opposed to a department or program. When it was discussed last year, many wondered if it was needed or if it would be an endaround the department's authority to decide teaching assignments. In the new proposal it is clear that this is meant for those wishing to teach a course outside of their department/program with the support appropriate to the procedures of their department/program. Any numbers of students taught would count towards the total number of "seats" for their home department/program much like the COLL 100/150. Proposed COLL 300/400 classes would first go through appropriate department/program committees/procedures and then on to the CLA. The CLA will form a committee to decide whether the course fits within the COLL curriculum. If it passes this committee it will then go on to EPC and follow standard review procedures appropriate to its COLL designation. Some of the benefits of this proposal would include avenues for new areas of teaching for faculty, allow for greater flexibility for students within their major as classes will not have a dept/program prefix so they will not count against the major for total number of COLL courses allowed and will allow interdisciplinary majors more options particularly at the COLL 400 level where many of the current COLL 400's are restricted to majors within the department/program.

There was strong support from the EPC committee for this proposal. One related issue that came up, was the desire for a mechanism to ensure that smaller departments with less faculty/teaching power have an equal opportunity to teach in these new proposals as their home departments/programs may not be able/want to let their limited faculty teach outside of their area.

ADDITIONAL COLL 300 ATTRIBUTES

The second proposal from CLA is for additional COLL 300 attributes in banner.

This would not in any way change the requirements or the courses delivery but simply be a mechanism to better track how students are fulfilling this requirement. While they are not set any specific structure for these additional attributes, a potential structure might be:

COLL 300C: Campus COLL 300

COLL 300W: Washington-based COLL 300 COLL 300S: Study Abroad COLL 300

COLL 300P: Special Programs COLL 300 (AMES, iGEM, MANOS/SOMOS, Bosnia Project)

The committee fully supported this idea.

As the committee was in strong support of both proposals, it was decided that at the current time there was no need for CLA to come and present their proposals with the understanding that we reserve the right to request a presentation if further questions arise.

6. **On the horizon for EPC:** The chair notified the committee that sometime during the year, most likely this winter (spring 2019) that we will again be discussing COLL 199.
