Pass/Fail options for Fall 2020

In light of the unusual pandemic conditions that students and faculty are operating under, the Dean's office proposes:

I. That all undergraduate A&S students be allowed to choose one class for a P/F grade as long as it is an elective class (i.e., not a COLL class, not for their major or minor requirements).

Approved.

II. That students have until Friday, September 11 to make this determination.

Substitute motion: Students have until [the last day of classes]... Substitute motion approved.

III. That EPC consider whether students should be allowed to select more than one class as P/F.

EPC decided that this possibility is not necessary under current conditions. This possibility will be reconsidered later in the semester if it seems warranted.

Summary of discussion:

There was extensive discussion of these motions, with both strong support and strong opposition expressed during the discussion.

There is student support (including via an online petition) for flexibility in selecting P/F grading. Arguments include the added stress induced by working under pandemic conditions and the possibility of change in course modality (face-to-face transitioning to online, etc) during the semester. Increased flexibility in grading modality would ease some of the added stress. It was mentioned that students do not take many electives, so the P/F option as proposed might not apply to many students' schedules.

Arguments against enhanced P/F options include potential difficulties in graduate and professional school applications, and confusion related to rules for majors and minors. What do undeclared students do if their P/F course is required for the major that they would later select?

There was discussion regarding whether P/F options should include COLL and major/minor courses. No substitute motion that would allow these possibilities was proposed.

In the end, EPC favored allowing a single P/F grade per student (including Freshmen and Sophomores) for elective courses (Motion I), and an extension of the deadline for students to determine whether to select the P/F option until the last day of classes (Substitute Motion II). Students should be advised to speak with their advisor prior to making any decision that would affect their transcript. The Dean's office should share guidance with students regarding policy for students who would declare a major/

minor after selecting a P/F grade in a major/minor course. By default, students would need to petition the Committee on Degrees on a case-by-case basis.
