The Faculty of Arts and Sciences has charged the Educational Policy Committee with conducting “a continuing study of the undergraduate educational program, regularly reviewing the educational policies and procedures of the faculty.”

Main actions of the committee during the 2009-2010 academic year included:

- Review and approval of the report of the ad hoc St. Andrews Review Committee. In particular, EPC concluded that the GERs would be satisfied by students participating in the program, especially if proper and careful advising were part of the program.
- Approval of the minor in Marine Science (a proposal put forward by the departments of Biology and Geology and the Virginia Institute of Marine Science).
- Creation of INTR 499, a standing course for internships associated with the Washington Semester.
- Review of the assessment of GER 4. The general conclusion is that the objectives of GER 4 are being met.
- Rejection of Proposal to change GER 4 course distribution. Given the small number of 4B courses, the Dean for Undergraduate Studies proposed changing the distribution of GER4A, B, and C. The net effect of the change would be not to require a GER4B course. The committee rejected the proposal under the rationale that such a change is best discussed in the context of the upcoming review of the curriculum.
- Made a minor clarification to the catalog section describing GER 4 or 5 credit for study abroad courses not taught by W&M or W&M affiliated faculty.
