#### **Main Actions**

### FALL:

 In parallel with a series of faculty discussions at FAS meetings, amending the proposed new general education curriculum and presenting it for a vote in December, 2013. The new curriculum was approved.

# SPRING:

- In conjunction with Faculty Fellows and working groups that include faculty-at-large, EPC will be helping develop specific criteria for the COLL courses. These criteria will provide guidelines both for faculty who want to propose COLL courses and for the EPC to determine whether proposed courses fit the specific COLL requirements.
- EPC endorsed a proposal from the Honors Committee to re-name the "Departmental Honors Program" to the Arts and Sciences "Honors Thesis Program" and to revise the department-level designation to "Honors Thesis in [specific department]. This change will bring the title in line with its current requirements and purpose. The motion is scheduled for the Feb 4<sup>th</sup> FAS meeting.
- EPC will be bringing a proposal to the FAS regarding the awarding of credits related to student for educational experience gained from service in the armed forces of the United States.
