Spring 2022 Undergraduate Internship Opportunities with W&M Law Centers & Clinics

W&M undergraduate students are invited to apply for internship opportunities with one of three W&M research centers and legal clinics: The Center for Racial and Social Justice (<u>CRSJ</u>), The Parents Engaged in Learning Equality (<u>PELE</u>) Special Education Advocacy Clinic, and The Virginia Coastal Policy Center (<u>VCPC</u>). Undergraduate internship position descriptions for each opportunity are attached and brief descriptions of each center or clinic appear below.

Students selected for internships will coordinate Spring 2022 undergraduate internship credit by working with Professor Chris Nemacheck in the Government Department (clnema@wm.edu). We are especially interested in applicants who have overcome unusual adversity and/or are members of underrepresented groups who would contribute to diversity in the field of law. BIPOC, first-generation, and low-income students are encouraged to apply.

CRSJ:

CRSJ engages in a range of activities: It provides educational programming on a range of race- and social justice issues for the William & Mary community of students, faculty and staff, and alumni, and the broader community; and faculty fellows work with undergraduate and graduate students to conduct research and publish their findings to better understand and advance justice-related issues.

PELE Special Education Advocacy Clinic:

The PELE Clinic represents local families of children with disabilities in ensuring they receive the free, appropriate public education required by law. The Clinic currently has 15 students enrolled, and these students primarily handle the cases. Beyond the students enrolled, the Clinic needs assistance in providing its services to clients and the community, as well as developing and executing revenue generating projects.

VCPC:

The Virginia Coastal Policy Center (VCPC) at William & Mary Law School provides science-based legal and policy analysis of ecological issues affecting the state's coastal resources, providing education and advice to a host of Virginia's decision-makers, from government officials and legal scholars to nonprofit and business leaders. VCPC students' highly diverse interactions beyond the borders of the legal community provide the framework for their efforts in solving the complex coastal resource management issues that currently face Virginia and the nation.

The Center for Racial & Social Justice (CRSJ) seeks undergraduate interns for Spring 2022, with the expectation the undergraduate receives academic credit for work associated with the internship.*

CRSJ engages in a range of activities: It provides educational programming on a range of race- and social-justice issues for the William & Mary community of students, faculty and staff, and alumni, and the broader community; and faculty fellows work with undergraduate and graduate students to conduct research and publish their findings to better understand and advancing justice-related issues.

The undergraduate interns will work approximately 8-10 hours per week, and have the following responsibilities:

- Conducting research with Center Director and/or Faculty Fellows on issues related to race and social justice. This research may address:
 - o criminal system reform
 - o racial justice in public K-12 education
 - o issues relating to transgender students (policies accommodating; trans student athletes)
- Coordinating with experts in their online programs
- Assisting in coordinating meetings and otherwise providing support for advocacy efforts
- Curating content from faculty, students, alumni, and conference speakers for clinic social media platforms
- Assisting in developing/publishing Center blog
- Supporting grant applications
- Providing administrative support in the maintenance of online files
- Other duties as assigned by the Center Director and Fellows

The undergraduate interns will be supervised by the Center Director, and Faculty and Post-Graduate Legal Fellows. They will have a weekly meeting with the Director and Fellows, and participate in additional meetings as needed. Interns can have some flexibility in their work schedules. The PELE Clinic represents local families of children with disabilities in ensuring they receive the free, appropriate public education required by law. The Clinic currently has 15 students enrolled, and these students primarily handle the cases. Beyond the students enrolled, the Clinic needs assistance in providing its services to clients and the community, as well as developing and executing revenue-generating projects.

The undergraduate interns will work approximately 8-10 hours per week, and have the following responsibilities:

- Providing attorney-approved technical assistance to potential clients on special education law matters and providing referrals where applicable
- Attending client meetings and writing memos
- Developing and revising modules for online course for military families
- Coordinating with experts in their online presentations for courses
- Assisting in coordinating meetings and otherwise providing support for state-wide advocacy efforts
- Assisting with logistics for online courses, including but not limited to developing marketing materials, preparing CLE credit applications, maintaining class rosters, monitoring class discussion, coordinating live online activities
- Curating content from students, alumni, and conference speakers for clinic social media platforms
- Conducting research for professor on special education law topics of import
- Tracking case/client data and supporting grant applications
- Providing administrative support in the maintenance of online files

The undergraduate interns will be supervised by the PELE Clinic Director and Post-Graduate Legal Fellow. They will have a weekly meeting with the Director and Fellow, and participate in client meetings as needed.
