

Letter from the Chair

Dear Alumni, Faculty, Staff, and Current Students,

I hope that your Fall is off to a good start. Our semester has been another exciting one, with 337 current majors, 27 students graduating at the end of the semester, and 149 students expected to graduate in May. In addition, our cohort of 6 students in our M.S. program are making solid progress toward defending their thesis, and our 9 incoming students are already making important contributions to the success of our department.

As it turns out, I am writing this letter from a plane as I travel to the Society for Neuroscience annual meeting. Two students from my lab are able to join me and present their findings at this conference. There are around 30,000 participants at this meeting. This experience exposes students to such an incredible variety of neuroscience research from around the world. In some cases, students are meeting with prospective graduate school advisors. The opportunity for one-on-one interactions with prospective advisors along with graduate students already working with the prospective faculty advisor provides invaluable information as our students choose which graduate program to attend. My favorite part of the conference is re-connecting with former W&M students. One of the most rewarding aspects of my job is hearing about the success of students who were in my lab or in my classes. Last year, one of my first honors students was starting her first year in a faculty position and another one of my students is applying for faculty positions this year. If this meeting is like previous Society for Neuroscience meetings, I will see W&M alumni who have moved into a variety of different career paths, such as advocating for mental health awareness, working for a pharmaceutical or biotechnology company, or working within the book and journal publishing field. I appreciate the opportunity to hear updates about how things are going with our alumni and about how these alumni apply the skills learned at W&M to their careers. I hope that you will consider giving us an update about how you are doing


