

# BA, International Honours Planning Guide



We have developed this guide and planning tool to assist students in planning their path through the BA Int Hons degree. It is a good idea to review this guide and plan prior to each advising meeting. For a complete list of regulations and policies, consult the W&M Catalog and St Andrews policy documents. While this guide summarizes the key points of the degree, students are expected to also consult and become familiar with all degree requirements and policies in the W&M catalog and St Andrews Policy documents. ## Sub-honours Years

During sub-honours years, students should focus on passing all major-required classes/modules, passing a COLL 150 (the Lower Division Writing Requirement) at W&M, and meeting (nearly) all proficiencies and breadth requirements. Note that proficiencies and breadth requirements can be met with pre-matriculation credit (AP, IB, etc). Items met with pre-matriculation credit will show as completed in DegreeWorks but note that no credit will be awarded. A single class (either pre- or post-matriculation) can meet up to two breadth requirements and/or proficiencies. For example, a COLL 150 in BIOL can meet the World of Nature breadth requirement AND satisfy the Lower Division Writing Requirement).

In the spirit of the liberal arts, students are encouraged to take classes that interest them outside of their major. These classes may also enable exploration of possible minors. Completing the introductory courses for a minor during sub-honours is often required in order to meet minor requirements. Consult the W&M catalog for a list of minors and their requirements. Note that completing a minor is difficult and requires advance planning.

In late January of the second year, students will decide where to spend the third year of the degree. To make this decision, we recommend that students consider what kind of research experience they wish to pursue during their fourth year: St Andrews dissertation or project, W&M Honors Thesis, or W&M independent study or capstone coursework (see details in the major guidelines section). Students are encouraged to speak with their major advisor, peer advisors and 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> year students in the Programme to learn more. This is particularly important if a student wishes to complete a W&M Honors Thesis: each major has different processes, so early conversations are necessary to facilitate finding the right thesis advisor and meeting requirements in a timely manner.

## Honours Years

During honours years, students should focus on

- 1) passing all major-required courses/modules;
- 2) ensuring that all proficiencies and breadth requirements will be met prior to graduation;
- 3) passing sufficient 300(0) and 400(0) classes/modules; and
- 4) completing the research requirement/capstone.

*Nearly all* courses/modules taken during honours should be at the 300(0) or 400(0) level. When taking a normal load of 60 credits during honours years, no more than 7.5 credits can be at 100 and 200 level. Students who are completing minors should be especially careful of the credit count requirements. Consult the BA International honours checklist or the W&M catalog for the list of the credit requirements during honours years.

Students may participate in graduation ceremonies at both institutions. In addition, students will need to apply to graduate at both institutions, regardless of whether they will attend both ceremonies or attend only one. W&M Latin Honors will be determined based upon the student's GPA calculated across *all four years*. St Andrews Degree Classification will be determined based upon the GPA of all 300(0) and 400(0) level courses taken *during honours years*. ## **Guidelines for the Economics Major**

### **COLL 150**

Your COLL 150 *does not need* to be in Economics. In fact, it can be advantageous to choose a COLL 150 that also meets a breadth requirement.

### **Sub-Honours (lower-level) Economics courses**

First year students must fulfill the ECON 101/102 major requirement. We recommend taking one econ course per semester. There are many ways to do this:

- 1) If you do not have pre-matriculation credit for either ECON 101 or 102, then register for ECON 101 in the Fall and ECON 102 in the Spring.
- 2) If you have pre-matriculation credit for ECON 101, then register for ECON 102 in the Fall and ECON 303 OR 304 in the Spring.
- 3) If you have pre-matriculation credit for ECON 102, then register for ECON 101 in the Fall and ECON 303 OR 304 in the Spring.
- 4) If you have pre-matriculation credit for both ECON 101 and 102, then you may register for ECON 303 OR ECON 304 in any order, since ECON303 is not a prerequisite for ECON 304.

### **Honours (upper-level) Economics courses**

The upper-level requirements do not have to be taken in any particular order.

All economics courses at W&M above 308 count as 400(0)-level for the purposes of the degree. At W&M, any of the 300-level and 400-level courses can be taken in year 3 or year 4.

Note: Not all upper-level courses in the catalog are offered every year.

### **Fourth Year Research Requirement**

*At St Andrews*

All Economics majors spending Year 4 at St Andrews must do a dissertation: EC 4498 for one semester or EC 4499 for a full year.

### *At W&M*

Economics majors spending Year 4 at W&M can take any ECON course with a COLL 400 designation (different topics are offered in fall and spring, varying from year to year) *OR* apply to do an Honors Thesis (ECON 495 and 496, 6 credits total). Either option satisfies the Fourth Year Research Requirement. The Honors program at W&M is selective and it is not guaranteed that all students who desire to complete an Honors Thesis will be able to do so.

Students who are interested in completing an Honors Thesis should first consult the Honors Projects in Economics [website](#). Students are encouraged to explore possible research topics for their Honors Thesis during their junior year *at the latest*. The best way to do this is to discuss potential areas of interest or specific topics with individual faculty members. For BA Int Hons/JDP students, earlier discussions with potential faculty advisors and continued contact via email or zoom meetings while away at St Andrews will be critical.

Students will seek out a potential Honors Project advisor during their junior year. This professor will supervise and help guide the project proposal. Together with that faculty mentor, the student will come up with the broad outline of a research topic. We strongly recommend that students and project advisors agree on a topic before summer. During the summer between your junior and senior years, students will read widely about their chosen topic and will prepare a formal honors proposal for the potential advisor to evaluate in August. The proposal should include a detailed discussion of the project's purpose, methods, and a bibliography. Proposals are normally three to five pages in length.
