# **CENTER OVERVIEW**

Started in 2001, the W&M Washington Center exists to serve and support W&M students, faculty, alumni, and families. Since its inception, the Center has grown to become William & Mary's "Campus in the City," running Study in DC academic opportunities for undergraduate students.

With many possibilities for growth, the Center partners with faculty from departments across the university to offer high-impact learning experiences for students in all majors. The topics offered are diverse and extend far beyond government and policy, to include art, music, business, education, and more.

#### **Study in DC** opportunities exist year-round:

- DC Semester Program
   A deep-dive into one theme with a topically-related internship, runs each fall and spring semester
- DC Winter Seminars
   An intensive 10-day opportunity between semesters in January
- DC Summer Institutes
   A condensed version of the semester opportunity run each summer
- DC Summer Session
   A distinct hybrid learning experience featuring class speakers for a week in DC

All four Study in DC opportunities feature connections with W&M's robust DC-area alumni network. These committed alumni offer students a chance to learn directly from topic-specific experts and practitioners. The alumni also serve as mentors, counseling students in a one-on-one setting as they prepare to take their experiences to life beyond W&M.

The small Washington Center team offers individualized support to each student who comes through the door. Students also have a personal relationship with the staff and faculty in DC, which enhances the quality of the overall student experience.

In 2018-2019, 285 students studied in DC.

With a focus on diversity and inclusion, the Washington Center is raising more funds each year for its Study in DC Scholarship Fund so that all students who want to learn in DC, are afforded the opportunity. For 2018-19 alone, the Center gave out almost \$50,000 in scholarships, hoping to give more in subsequent years with the help of a new Advisory Board. In partnership with this Board and University Advancement, the Center is planning to better bring DC-area alumni together to more cohesively support one another and our growing student body.

Together with many partners, the W&M Washington Center prepares students for life after W&M and provides a home for the entire W&M family.




In addition to alumni events, the Center works with many departments across campus to host class visits, student trips, and other meetings. A few examples from 2018-2019 include:

# **FINANCES**


In 2018-2019, the W&M Washington Center budget was made up of 13% university funding, 28.5% student rent payments, and 58.5% student tuition/fees, for a total of \$1,043,274.94. Expenses came in at \$1,057,858.67 (broken down below), which meant tapping into a small reserve to make up the difference. For 2019-2020, we hope to build the reserve back up so we can account for the varying student enrollments in the future.

# **2018-2019 HIGHLIGHTS**

The W&M Washington Center has had a wonderful academic year, filled with positive, strategic growth, and deep, meaningful student experiences. The Center team is proud of several accomplishments in particular:

Molly Harris has increased our fundraising efforts and provided more scholarships, in higher amounts, to more students than ever before. The Center gave away 23 scholarships this year (in comparison to just 13 the year before) for a total of \$48,111 in awards (as opposed to \$8,200 in 2017-2018).

Molly also developed a Tribe Funding application that was approved and raised \$5,000 by more than 50 donors, the highest number in the pool. Molly is also partnering with our colleagues in Advancement to explore corporate giving options for the future.

**Rhys Tucker** managed a wide variety of student needs this year. From personal crisis to law school recommendations, Rhys helped his Semester Program students thrive in DC.

Rhys also managed the Center's increasingly complex budget with ease and efficiency, planning for more strategic financial operations in the future.

**Erin Battle** took on the challenge of DC course creation this year. She worked with EPC, CAS, the Registrar's Office, Bursar's Office, and many department chairs to ensure all of the DC courses were submitted, approved, and running smoothly for all Study in DC opportunities. Erin continues this work into next year, connecting with these offices and more, to ensure all of our processes are in line with university processes. Erin also worked with the Dean of Students Office to realign DC emergency protocols with updated campus protocols.


Look for more integrations in 2020!

In late April, Adam Anthony, who served the Center for 15 years, stepped down as Executive Director. Roxane Adler Hickey has stepped in as Interim Director and is thrilled by the opportunity to work with an experienced team of program managers to take the Center into the new academic year. A search process is currently underway for a new full-time Office & Event Coordinator, who will ideally start this fall.

In light of the leadership change, the W&M Washington Center has embarked upon a Listening Campaign this summer with a goal of 100 conversations in 50 days. The team looks forward to sharing the results of this campaign, with a highlighted list of priorities for 2019-2020, with the entire university this fall.

With a new Advisory Board and new Center leadership, and with the guidance of a new President and Provost, the Center is poised for great things in the years to come!
