Parking

W&M parking pass is not required to park on campus Friday through Sunday of Family Weekend. You may park in any regular Faculty/Staff, Day Student, or Resident Student space on campus, unless otherwise indicated. Handicapped spaces are available throughout campus for those with an official state-issued handicapped license plate or hangtag.

NO PARKING is allowed in fire lanes, No Parking zones, "Official Vehicle" spaces, "Service Vehicle" spaces, "Reserved At All Times" spaces, other specially reserved spaces, handicapped spaces (without appropriate documentation.) Parking meters are enforced at all times, unless the meter specifies otherwise.

Special Parking Advisory: Saturday Afternoon

Due to the football game on Saturday night, several parking areas will be closed starting at 7:00 am through the end of the game. **Vehicles parked in these areas during restricted hours will be ticketed and/or towed:** Zable Stadium/Bryan lot, Sadler Center lot, Old Dominion lot, Yates lot, James Blair lot, spaces on James Blair Drive, Kaplan Arena lot*, rear Frat lots, spaces near Alumni House, spaces on Harrison Avenue, Laycock Center, designated spaces on College Terrace and Dawson Circle.

Handicapped Accessible Parking

Handicapped parking spaces are available at parking lots throughout campus. A state-issued license plate or hangtag is required to park in these spaces.

Several campus parking areas must be cleared by 7:00 am Saturday in preparation for the football game. For guests attending the football game, a limited number of handicapped parking spaces are available at the Zable Stadium lot for \$10. These spaces will be filled on a first-come first-served basis. Additional parking for the game is available at the Kaplan Arena lot for \$10. A golf cart shuttle will transport guests with limited mobility from the bus shelter in the Kaplan Arena lot to the football stadium starting 90 minutes before kick-off. The shuttle will make return trips to the Kaplan Arena lot for up to 30 minutes after the game ends.

** Parking attendants will be on-duty at Kaplan Arena lot starting at 7:00 am on Saturday, 9/29. Visitors may park in the Kaplan Arena lot for a fee of \$10 (first-come, first-served).*

Football Tickets

If you ordered football tickets by the deadline, your tickets should have been mailed. If you did not receive your tickets by mail, they will be available: Monday-Friday at Kaplan Arena box office (8:30 am-5:00 pm); or on game day, at Zable Stadium Will Call starting at 3:00 pm for the 6:00 pm kickoff.

The student ticket will require a W&M ID to be presented with the ticket at the gate of entry to Zable Stadium. Will Call is available at Gate 1. On game day, guest services will open at Zable Stadium starting three hours before kickoff. Questions about football tickets should be directed to the Tribe Ticket Box Office (757-221-3340). Football tickets are not available at the Family Weekend check-in site.

Open Classes (Friday only)

You are welcome to attend any open class on the list, even if your student is not in the class. Please do not attend a class that is not on the list. The classes listed are those that have been designated by faculty to receive visitors. Please remember to observe appropriate classroom etiquette—turn off cell phones and refrain from having private conversations during the class.

Weather Related Most outdoor activities will be moved indoors if the weather is bad. Rain sites are listed next to each event in the schedule, as appropriate. Weather related updates will be communicated via the email and cell phone number listed on the registration form.

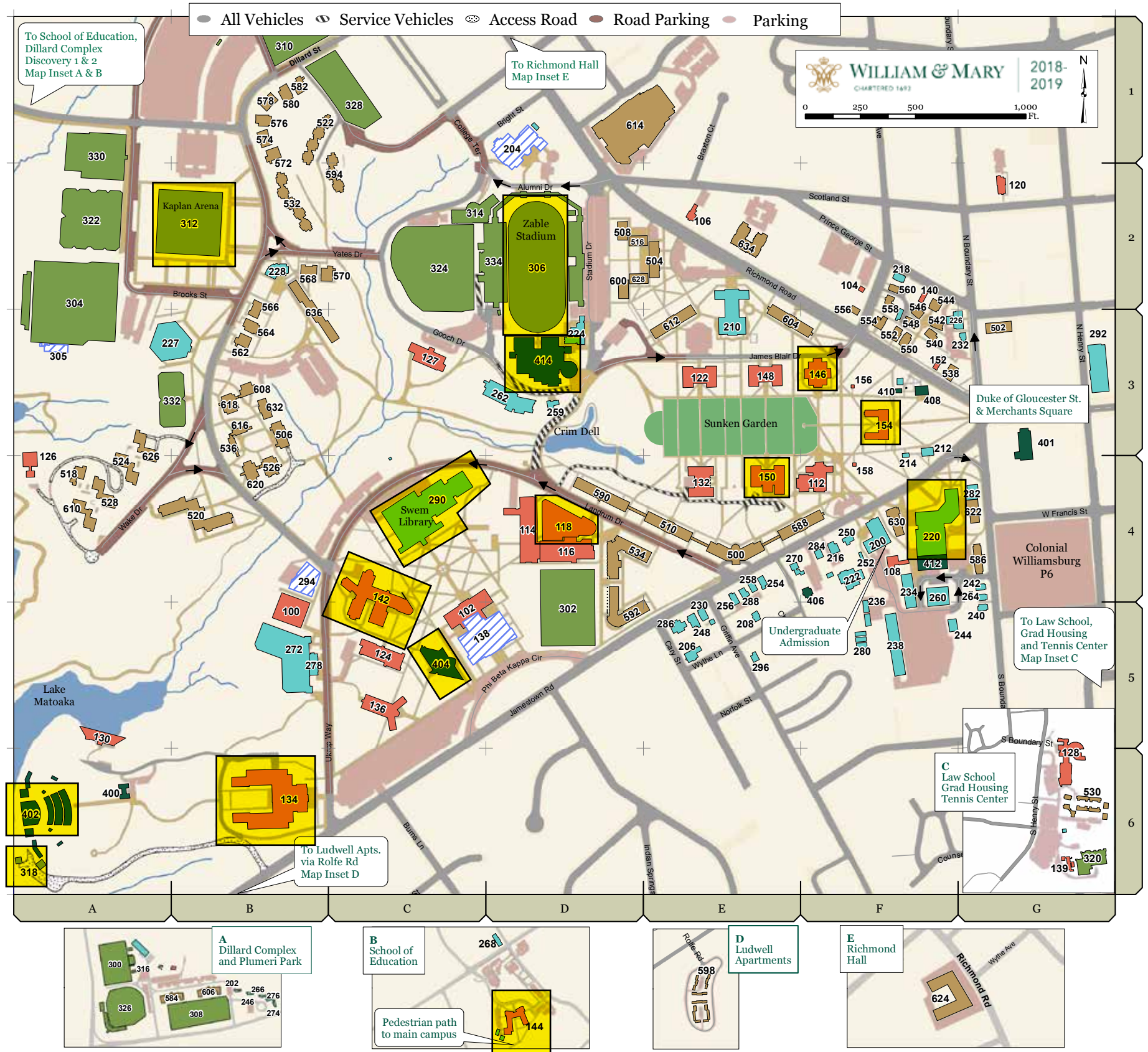

Paying for Healthcare: Economic Incentives in a Multipayer System

Jennifer Mellor, Professor of Economics

Washington Hall, Room 201

Debates about a future single-payer system persist, but today's reality is that U.S. healthcare is financed by many different payers. Who pays for healthcare depends on how old you are, where you live, and where you work, among other factors. This talk will focus on some of the economic incentives affecting healthcare providers and consumers in a multiple payer context. I'll first provide a brief description of healthcare financing in the U.S.. Next, I'll draw on my own research to describe how health economists investigate the impacts of public policy in a multiple payer context, and what effects those policies can have on costs, access, and quality.

How American Evangelical Christians Tried (and Failed) to Change the World of Sports

Annie Blazer, Associate Professor of Religious Studies

Integrated Science Center, Room 1127

With the rise of televised sports, some Christians began to see sport as a resource for evangelism. Sports ministry founders imagined celebrity athletes as spokespeople with the respect of anon-believing population and potential to garner a large audience. The power of these celebrities inspired evangelicals to begin sports ministry, but they came to realize that the same ideology that allowed sporting celebrities to wield significant cultural power also made them morally vulnerable. If one's power (both in the sports world and as an evangelist) was contingent on winning, then winning remained a central and unchallenged goal of sport. Sporting celebrities could draw attention to Christianity, but if they also behaved in morally questionable ways on (or off) the field, was this attention achieving its goal? This talk will address the history of sports ministry in the U.S. and the unintended consequences of trying to use sport for evangelical means.

Shifting Focus: Language, Fariation, and Identity in the Greater Caribbean.

Iyabo Osiapem, Senior Lecturer of Africana Studies and Linguistics

Tucker Hall, Room 127A

Linguistic atlases have been a staple of the dialectology landscape since its earliest days. The goal of a linguistic atlas is to document language variation and map linguistic features regionally—including but not limited to lexical features (words), phonological features (sounds), and syntactic features (grammatical structure). In our work, we will listen for specific targeted items (like shared nouns or referents), collect demographic as well as sociolinguistic data, and we will use the data for comparative purposes to map dialect and language regions. The final result will be a visual representation of diversity that allows us to see patterns that might be obscured by textual representation. Ultimately, this is a service project for the region providing freely available data for students, the public, and with the potential for more detailed data for researchers.

Oysters Past and Present, and the Future of the Chesapeake Bay

Rowan Lockwood, Professor of Geology

Integrated Science Center, Room 1221

Oyster populations in the Chesapeake Bay have declined precipitously in the past two centuries, due to overharvesting and disease. Because these ecosystems were decimated long before scientists could study them, the fossil record provides our only opportunity to "observe" a healthy, natural oyster reef. Fossil oysters lived 4-5 times longer, and grew 3-4 times larger, than modern oysters, primarily because humans preferentially harvest large oysters in the bay today. From a paleontological perspective, the goals of oyster conservation should shift away from planting shell and releasing oyster larva to establishing long-term sanctuaries which protect larger oysters. The fossil record gives us a glimpse into the world of oyster reefs before humans—and provides new hope for the future of the Chesapeake Bay.
