# Keynote Speaker:

## Dr. John H. Stewart, VI



John H. Stewart, IV, MD, MBA, is the founding director of the Louisiana State University- Louisiana Children's Medical Center Cancer Center. He also holds the rank of Professor of Surgery, Louisiana State University New Orleans School of Medicine. Under his leadership, Dr. Stewart sets the overall mission, vision and direction for multidisciplinary cancer care and cancer clinical research programs for LSU Health New Orleans and LCMC Health.

Before he arrived at LSU, Dr. Stewart served as the deputy director for the University of Illinois Cancer Center and physician executive for oncology services for the University of Illinois Health System. He was also a member of the initial class of Presidential Scholars for the University of Illinois. Dr. Stewart's previous leadership roles include serving as the chief of surgery at the Durham VAMC, vice-chair in the Wake Forest School of Medicine Department of Surgery, and associate dean for clinical research and innovation at the Wake Forest University School of Medicine.

Dr. Stewart received his medical degree from Howard University and completed his general surgery residency at Vanderbilt University Medical Center. He completed fellowships in surgical oncology, tumor immunology, and molecular oncology at the National Cancer Institute. Dr. Stewart has established a national profile in education, scientific research, and cancer care delivery to underserved populations. His clinical interests are in general surgical oncology, focusing on melanoma, tumor immunotherapy, and peritoneal surface malignancies.

Dr. Stewart serves as a director for the American Board of Surgery, the chair of the American College of Surgeons Advisory Council for General Surgery, and a member of the Halsted Society Board of Directors. Best Doctors, Top Doctors, and Top Surgeons have recognized Dr. Stewart for his patient care achievements. In addition, the National Cancer Institute, Amgen, and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation have funded his research efforts.

He has published over 100 manuscripts in peer-reviewed journals, including *Cancer*, *Annals of Surgery*, *JAMA Surgery*, the *Journal of the American College of Surgeons*, the *Journal of Thoracic and Cardiovascular Surgery*, the *Journal of Immunotherapy*, *Annals of Surgical Oncology*, the *Journal of Surgical Research*, *Transplantation*, *Surgery*, and *Cancer Gene Therapy*.

# Sessions

## **Professional Development Session – Values and Flourishing with Dr. Kelly Crace September 20 – 10:45 am – 12:00 pm**

Kelly is the Associate Vice President for Health & Wellness and the Director for the Center for Mindfulness and Authentic Excellence (CMAX) at William & Mary. He is a licensed psychologist and the co-author of *Authentic Excellence: Flourishing & Resilience in a Relentless World* and the *Life Values Inventory*. He has published and presented in the areas of values, flourishing, resilience, life role development & transition, and organizational development. He is president of Applied Psychology Resources and has conducted over three thousand seminars for organizations. He has served as director of two college mental health centers at Duke University and William & Mary. He received his academic and clinical training from Vanderbilt University, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and Duke University. Kelly was the recipient of the President’s Award for Service to the Community and the Chambers-Reid Award for Professional Excellence at William & Mary.

## **Tips and Tricks for Successful Academic Writing with Elizabeth Talbott September 20 – 12:15 – 1:15 pm**

Dr. Talbott is Professor and Associate Dean for Research and Faculty Development in the School of Education. Her academic preparation is in the fields of psychology and special education; she has worked both in adult psychiatry and as a public school teacher. She is passionate about research that contributes to positive outcomes for children and youth who have complex learning, behavioral, and mental health needs, with a particular emphasis in evidence-based assessment. Her research is both multi-disciplinary and collaborative: She works with colleagues in education, clinical and school psychology, and pediatrics on behalf of youth with disabilities. Dr. Talbott was a professor in special education at the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC) for more than 20 years and has served as department chair at both UIC and W&M. She regularly advocates on Capitol Hill on behalf of young people with disabilities with the Council for Exceptional Children (CEC), where she serves as Public Policy Chair in CEC’s Division for Research. Dr. Talbott’s collaborative research has been funded by the National Science Foundation, the National Institute of Mental Health, the Institute of Education Sciences, and the U.S. Department of Education.

Rosie Liljenquist is the publishing and open access librarian at William & Mary. She earned her MSc in Information Management and Preservation from the University of Glasgow. Her professional interests include the history of intellectual property; copyright, open access, and fair use; library instruction; and fairy tales.

## **Negotiating Faculty Offers with Dr. Suzanne Raitt** **September 20 – 3:00 – 4:00 pm**

Suzanne Raitt is Vice-Dean for Arts, Humanities & Interdisciplinary Studies, and Chancellor Professor of English at William & Mary. She came to William & Mary in 2000, after five years on the faculty at the University of London and then five years at the University of Michigan. Her books include *May Sinclair: A Modern Victorian* (Oxford, 2000), *Vita and Virginia: The Work and Friendship of V. Sackville-West and Virginia Woolf* (Oxford, 1993), and *Virginia Woolf's "To the Lighthouse"* (St Martin's, 1990). She also co-edited a collection of essays with Trudi Tate called *Women's Fiction and the Great War* (Oxford, 1997), and in 1995 she published an edited collection of essays on lesbian criticism, *Volcanoes and Pearl Divers* (Onlywomen Press). Editions include the Cambridge Edition of Virginia Woolf's *Orlando* (co-edited with Ian Blyth) in 2018, the Norton Critical Edition of Virginia Woolf's *Jacob's Room* in 2007, Katherine Mansfield's *Something Childish and Other Stories* for Penguin in 1996, and Virginia Woolf's *Night and Day* for Oxford World's Classics in 1992. She has published numerous essays and articles in journals including *Modernism/modernity* and *History Workshop Journal*, and for twelve years, she was on the editorial collective of *Feminist Studies*.



## **Tips for Successfully Preparing for the Job Search with Dr. Adrienne Petty** **September 21 – 10:30 – 11:15 am**

Dr. Adrienne Petty is a historian of the American South who examines the transformation of southern farming and rural life since the Civil War. She is an associate professor at William & Mary, where she teaches courses in U.S. history.

Petty co-directed the oral history project “Breaking New Ground: A History of African American Farm Owners,” which produced more than 300 interviews of southern black farmers and their descendants. Petty and the project’s co-director, historian Mark Schultz of Lewis University, are currently writing a history of African American farm owners that draws upon the interviews. Petty’s book, *Standing Their Ground: Small Farmers in North Carolina Since the Civil War* (2013), won the Theodore Saloutos Award of the Agricultural History Society and the H.L. Mitchell Award of the Southern Historical Association.
