The following guide has been made to assist participants in the selection of courses for your <u>Verto</u> <u>Experience</u>. The tables below offer information about course transfer and credit articulation of classes you can take in the upcoming academic year while studying abroad with Verto.

It is Verto's goal to work closely with partner universities to facilitate credit transfer on behalf of students. All courses are chosen based on a high degree of transferability and articulation to partner universities. However, partner universities have final authority in determining how credits transfer.

Generally, Verto recommends:

 Register for 15 credits. Consider completing an English, Math, and Lab-based Science course, depending upon transferability and prior learning credits (AP/IB Scores).

- Review your school's major(s) requirements, if you know what you intend to study post-Verto.
- Select courses that meet your personal learning interests and academic goals for study abroad, like studying a new language or exploring a new academic interest.

General Frequently Asked Questions:

What does it mean for a course to be articulated as a direct equivalent/direct transfer course?

- Courses that have been articulated as a Direct Equivalent/Direct Transfer credit mean that the
 course taught by the University of New Haven has been reviewed as being equivalent in content,
 level, and learning outcomes to a specific course at the partner institution.
- Courses that have not been articulated as a direct equivalent are still eligible to transfer, however,
 the Partner University does not offer the exact course on campus or the course taught by the
 University of New Haven does not meet the explicit content, level, or learning outcomes to their
 version of this course on campus. Many partners may allow these courses to fulfill core/major
 requirements, meet prerequisites, or they can help you explore different academic interests while
 working toward meeting the overall University credit requirement for graduation. Students should
 consult the partner university course catalog/resources provided to better understand how these
 courses will transfer.

Can I take a course that has not yet been articulated for transfer at my university?

Verto works with all partners to articulate courses in a timely manner. However, there may occasionally be courses pending transfer articulation at the time students submit course preferences or during the add/drop period. Students are advised to enroll in courses that have completed articulation information, whenever possible. However, participants may choose to enroll in courses pending articulation at the time of registration, if necessary. Verto cannot guarantee transferability and any courses students choose to enroll in pending articulation are the responsibility of the student to address directly with the partner university.

Will my grades be shared with my post-Verto institution directly?

Yes, midterm and end-of-term grades are directly shared with Verto academic partners.

What happens if I drop below the required GPA of my admissions requirement?

All participants will meet regularly with onsite staff to review grades and GPA progress toward meeting your post-Verto admissions requirements. Students who are off-track based upon mid-term grades will work with onsite staff to determine an academic action plan and may have additional requirements from Verto and/or the Channel Partner to fulfill in order to stay on the channel pathway program. Verto provides academic success advising and coaching to support students in reaching their goals, and will help students who are unable to meet the goals determine a new plan of action.
