

## **W&M Summer Program in Prague, Czech Republic Summer 2027**

**Estimated dates (subject to change):** May 26 to July 3, 2027

GEO will work with the host institution/onsite partners to confirm dates in fall 2026, resulting in possible changes from estimated dates.

**Size of Program:** program averages 37 - 40 students

In light of COLL300, programs are designed to be accessible to as many eligible students as possible. **Group size is determined based on an overseas partner's ability to accommodate and support groups.** *This program has a maximum capacity of 40 students.*

**Host Institution:** Charles University

### **Overview of Program**

One W&M faculty member serves as program director (PD) and teaches a 3-credit course in the program as well as a 1-credit preparatory course in spring 2027.

Courses and credits: Student choose two 3-credit courses and take a mandatory 1-credit course in Czech language, for a total of 7 credits. Students receive W&M grades and credits for these courses; courses may not be taken pass-fail.

Housing: Students may be housed either in a Charles University dormitory for international students.

Excursions/Activities: Guided excursions to sites of cultural and historical interest. Some past programs have included trips to Český Krumlov, Plzeň, Karlovy Vary, Kraków, Dresden, Berlin or Vienna, as well as shorter outings in the Prague vicinity.

### **COLL300**

All W&M programs teaching undergraduate students are expected to meet COLL 300 requirements. Course content will not be the only or the main consideration when evaluating the COLL 300 designation; other aspects of programs such as activities and excursions will also be considered.

Academic experiences include the course, assignments, course-related excursions, guest speakers or local faculty, engagement with members of the local community, and co-curricular cultural activities connected to the objectives of COLL 300.

The approved language for COLL 300 is as follows:

"COLL 300 courses explore the diverse perspectives and socio-cultural values of people and communities of countries outside the geographical boundaries of the United States, and/or within the geographical boundaries

of the United States for the study of sovereign Native nations, indigenous communities, and five US territories or sub-national entities.

COLL 300 directly connects students with people, places, and ideas that enhance their comprehension of different ways of thinking and being in the world. Students synthesize their knowledge, their emerging expertise in framing questions for analysis, and their communication skills to engage global issues in a self-reflective, cross-cultural way.

Students will be able to:

- demonstrate an understanding of how people across cultures and societies experience the world
- make connections between those perspectives and course content
- analyze how cultural and societal differences manifest globally
- reflect on their own identity as global citizens COLL 300"

COLL 300 experiences will ideally join students with people, places, and ideas (all three).

COLL 300 courses should have a self-reflective assignment built into them. (Approved by FAS March 2021.)”

**Qualifications for Program Directors**

Faculty members who expect to continue teaching at William & Mary in 2026-27 are eligible to apply, and will need be available on campus during fall 2026 and spring 2027 to work closely with Global Education Office (GEO) staff on program preparation, and to participate in the fall study abroad fair and fall/spring information sessions, summer program information and orientation sessions, and recruiting events. In addition, Summer 2027 Program Directors will need to be on campus in fall 2027 to meet with the future Program Director and participate in recruiting events.

Because the position of Program Director represents a full-time commitment, faculty members selected as PDs may not undertake any other teaching assignment, additional onsite student research projects, or research appointment during the time the program is in session.

Required: site-specific course. Courses must be linked to the local or regional setting of the program, but are not generally restricted to any given discipline.

Preferred: Familiarity with Czech.

Preferred: in-country or regional experience.

Preferred: experience in overseas studies program direction/administration/site review.

Preferred: research/teaching interests relevant to the program.

**W&M Faculty Compensation**

Program Direction:

Program director compensation covers preparatory work, on-site program direction, and post-program duties, and teaching. (Salaries are calculated

based on the duration of the on-site program – from the day students arrive through on-site student housing move-out).

Meal supplement and housing are provided for an additional 2 days on request.

**PD salary for 5-week plus program (with an onsite 3-credit course and spring 1- credit course) and based on general enrollment: estimated to be around \$18,270** Depending on exact program dates and possible adjustments to overall A&S summer teaching rates, this figure is subject to change. The quoted rates are based on estimated 2026 expenses.

All monetary amounts are subject to change.

Housing allowance (unless prearranged through the program, based on the lowest possible rates for one-bedroom accommodations). Housing costs for spouse/dependents/guests that incur any additional charges will be the direct responsibility of the Program Director.

Airfare: lowest economy-class direct flight available for purchase before the end of March 2027.

Meal supplement: One-third of the US State Department's M+IE per diem. For specifics, please see the US State Department's Office of Allowances website at [http://aoprals.state.gov/web920/per\\_diem.asp](http://aoprals.state.gov/web920/per_diem.asp).

Virginia state regulations require family members who accompany you to Prague or on any of the group activities to make their own arrangements and cover their own expenses. In addition, due to the full-time commitment of the program director to the program, including handling emergencies at all hours, it is expected that 24/7 care for dependents and family members by someone other than the PD be arranged by the PD at his/her own cost.

### **W&M Program Director Role and Duties**

Following is a general overview of the PD's duties:

- Assist GEO in sharing information with students interested in your course and program
- Teach a 1-credit preparatory course in spring 2026.
- Maintain contact with providers in the host country.
- Assist students with the visa application process (including EITAS).
- Review and complete responsibilities as outlined in the program director handbook.
- Serve as primary program contact with the Global Education Office.
- Work with GEO staff to make all group reservations (for group travel, meals, activities not arranged by host institution).

- Determine budget and courses in conjunction with GEO staff.
- Collaborate with the GEO staff to coordinate, organize and/or plan excursions.
- While on site, teach, care for students, and administer the program logistics and finances.
- Oversee the teaching activities of local faculty and assist in obtaining CVs of local faculty as needed.
- Ensure that courses are site-specific, explicitly linked to the local or regional setting of the program in line with COLL300 expectations.
- Remain in residence and available for the length of the program; it is expected that the Director will accompany students on their group excursions and that, with the exception of these excursions, s/he will be in residence at the program location for the entire duration of the program, including weekends.
- Provide financial oversight including tracking receipts that will be submitted upon return.
- Submit to the GEO and International Studies Advisory Committee (ISAC) a thorough report on the summer program (template will be provided).
- Complete responsibilities in order to satisfy COLL300 requirements.

**Selection  
Process**

The ISAC evaluates all proposals and selects program directors.

Program directors will be selected based on the following criteria: overall quality of course proposal; site-specific nature of course; synergy with other courses offered; expertise of the candidate; evidence of teaching effectiveness.

There is no preference for candidates who have recently directed or participated in this or other W&M faculty-led programs.

The ISAC will consider feedback from the GEO with regard to applicants who have directed prior W&M summer programs.

In addition, given the distinct responsibilities of the Program Director position, university administrators may contact appropriate offices (Provost, Dean, Title IX Coordinator) for information relating to the applicant. The applicant will be given the opportunity to respond to or explain any negative information thus obtained.
