IDEA Grant Awarded for Graduate Student Veteran Fireside Chat

On February 25, graduate military and veteran students at William & Mary gathered for the event "Empowering Graduate Student Veterans at William & Mary: Fostering Support, Resilience, and Community," made possible through the support of the Inclusion, Diversity, and Equity in Action (IDEA) Grant from William & Mary. This grant was applied for and awarded to Lindsay Blount, Ed.D. '24 who spearheaded the initiative to provide this valuable program.

The event featured Dr. Elizabeth Burgin, Ph.D., NCC, LPC-S, a distinguished expert in veteran services, and JD Due, executive director of the Center for Military Transition at William & Mary, as guest speakers. They shared insights on building community, fostering meaningful relationships, and navigating the challenges of being a graduate student veteran in a vibrant academic environment. The conversation focused on how veterans can strengthen their connections with peers and faculty, create supportive networks, and leverage resilience to overcome stress and burnout in educational spaces.





Transition Through Relationships Lunch & Learn



On February 27, the Center for Military Transition hosted Major General James Wright and alumnus Quinn Overton, MBA '17 for a lunch-and-learn discussion with our current cohort of active-duty officers in our residential MBA program.

Quinn shared his experiences as a student at William & Mary, in the remainder of his military career after receiving his MBA, and his transition story to his current role as a National Accounts Manager at Ferguson. Quin emphasized that "Your human skills and military experience, particularly your adaptability and capability to learn, lend themselves very well to anything you might want to do in Corporate America."

Describing Ferguson as "the biggest company you've never heard of, and the most veteran-friendly company you might not know about," Quinn also emphasized the importance of finding the right cultural fit for a transitioning veteran. "You can think about role, function, and industry, and you should" he remarked, "but the must important factor you must consider is understanding how corporate culture aligns with your values."

Quinn's transition journey was as remarkable as it was unique. While a student in the MBA program in 2016, Quinn's Executive Partner, retired IBM executive John McElroy, introduced Quinn to a neighbor who was a senior executive at Ferguson. Over the next 6-years, that senior executive served as a mentor to Quinn. They met quarterly, discussing a wide array of leadership and professional development topics that consistently focused on how – and where – Quinn might be able to apply his experience, education, and talent in a new chapter of service. When the time came for Quinn to retire, the executive told Quinn that Ferguson was the right place for him to continue to serve. Quinn then applied and was subsequently hired at Ferguson.


March 29 Wear Blue: Run to Remember
