President Tyler's farewell

"The experiment of admitting women to the College has been fully vindicated by the results of this year. The young ladies were models of decorum and stood among the first in their classes. I ... hope soon to see women fully accorded all the rights of the law and suffrage, which justly belong to them."

"The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex." - "Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation."
