LEVELS OF WMSURE SUCCESS

- Compared to a similar sample of non-WMSURE students, WMSURE students:
 - feel significantly more supported by faculty
 - are more likely to have a faculty mentor on campus
 - feel more informed about research
 - report being more interested in conducting research


