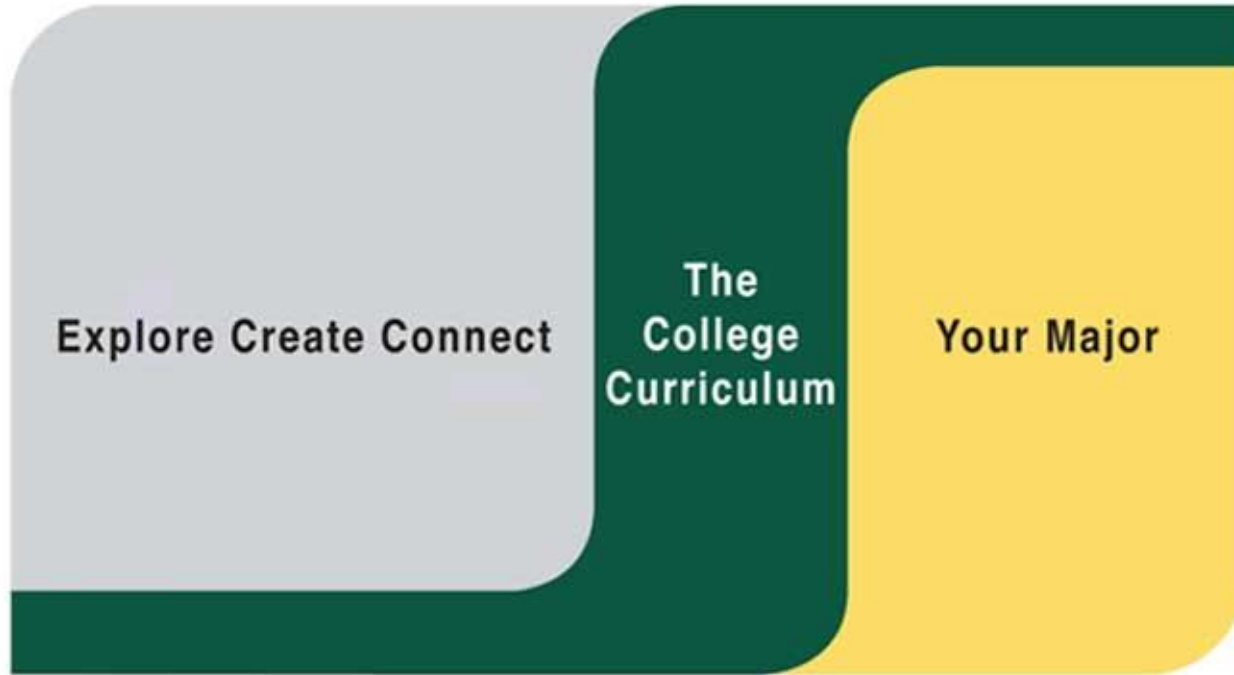

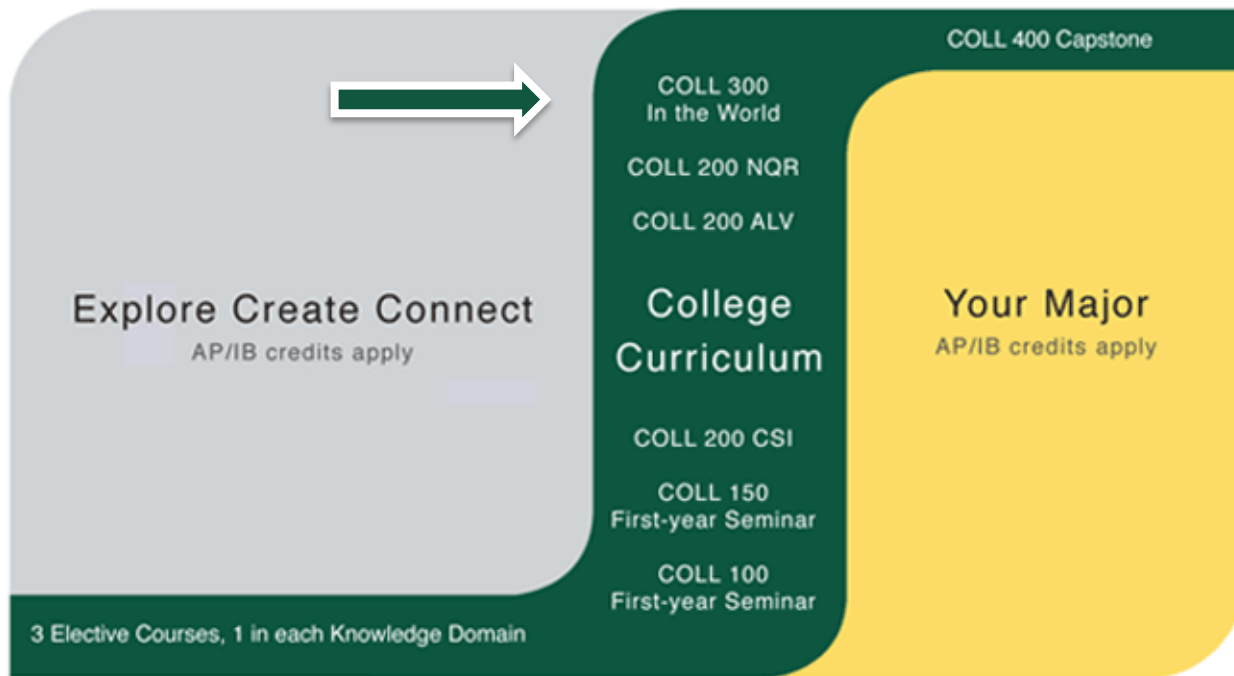

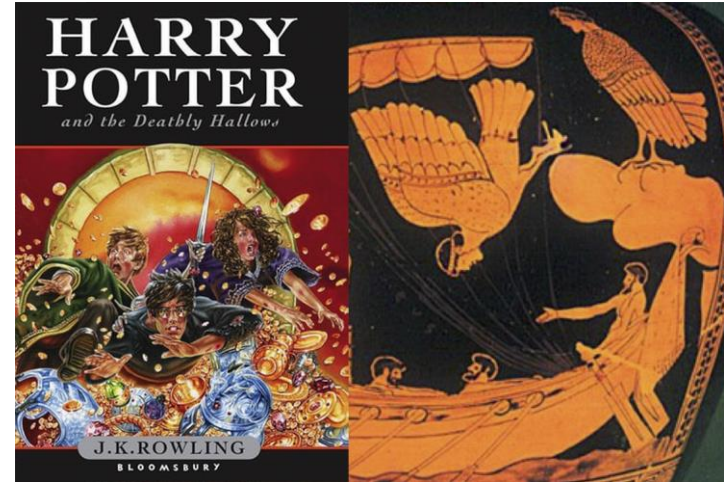

Is It Working?

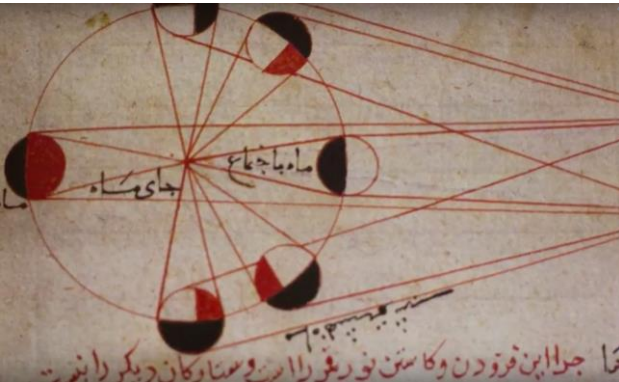
Ask the Students

"I gained the ability to articulate abstract thoughts and conceptual points for debates or discussions."

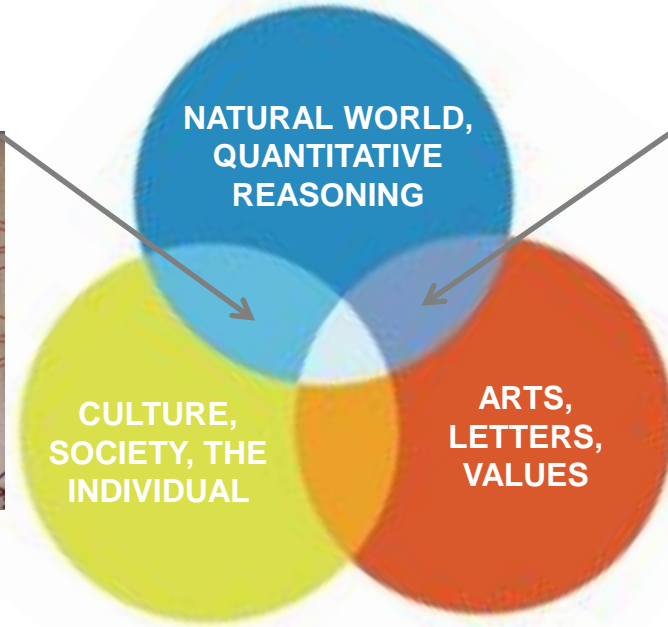
"To question how we know what we do and not to take our knowledge at face value."

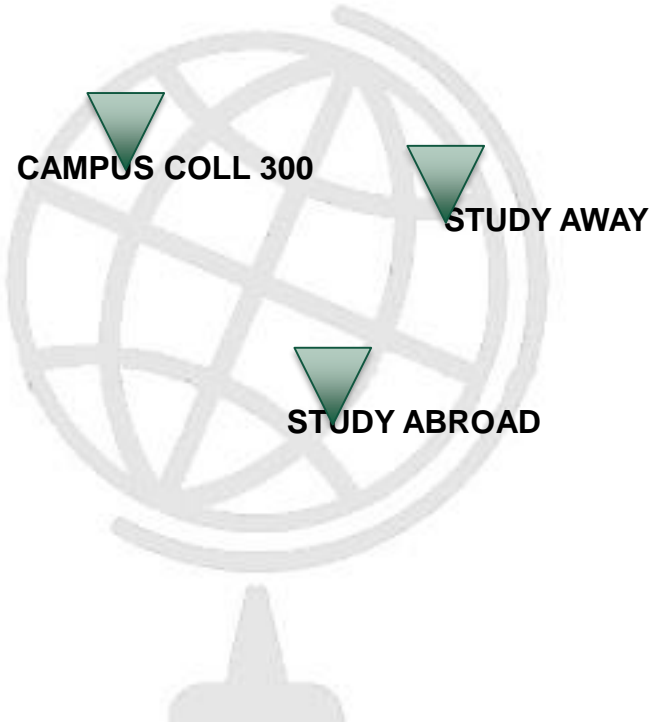

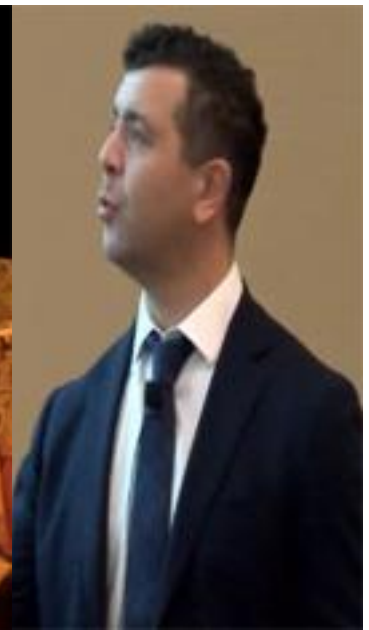
