Faculty Committee Updates

The faculty committees have been actively engaged and moving forward with many important initiatives.

Academic Standards and Appeals Committee (Professor Alice Henton, Chair)

- Evaluating policies for the Provisional Admissions program
- Discussions about Dual Enrollment, including review of draft Dual Enrollment Policy Manual
